
## Herman Husband [Marker] Moves West --History Corrected

A marker honoring Herman Husband's contributions to the Regulator movement was erected in 1951 just south of Siler City on South Chatham Avenue at a point where that road crosses Love's Creek. According to the marker, Husband "lived nearby." In 2006, local historian Warren Dixon, Jr. made a case to the Highway Historical Marker Program that the marker should be moved to its correct historical location on Sandy Creek in what is now Randolph County. Mr. Dixon presented overwhelming evidence that, while Herman Husband did own land in Chatham County—and some of it on Love's Creek—he never lived in Chatham. At the same time, Dixon provided numerous references to Husband's residence on Sandy Creek in Randolph.

The Historical Marker Program agreed with Mr. Dixon's thorough analysis, and a new marker with the same information was erected in Randolph County in 2007. The

Chatham County marker should have been removed at that time, but somehow the task failed to be completed until 2015—the last step in setting the record straight.
